Reading, studying, and meditating on God's Word is always first and foremost in any Bible study. Participants are encouraged to pray prior to beginning and at the conclusion of every lesson so that you might be receptive to the Holy Spirit and what He is speaking to you through this study.

<u>Legacy</u> is defined as something that is passed on: faith, ethics, and core values, monetary, or assets may come from one's character, reputation, and the life one leads-setting an example for others and to guide their future.

Our lives are only a vapor that appears and is gone in an instant; like a puff of smoke (James 4:14). Our legacy is what people will remember us for; something that will live on in the hearts and minds of others long after we leave this earth.

When most people think about leaving a legacy they automatically think in terms of money, property, businesses, or material possessions (fancy cars, elaborate homes, empires). Many people want to leave behind a legacy that will outlive them for generations to come. Parents will sometimes name their first-born male children after the father in order to carry on the *family name*. Large corporations spend billions of dollars each year to "perfect" their "brand" (the image they want to project to the world). Those things are only temporary and could sometimes lead to unexpected or unpleasant outcomes. A legacy can bring honor or shame upon a person or family.

A legacy may be passed down to children, other relatives (grandchildren, nieces, nephews, cousins, etc.) or to someone not related (God-children, Spiritual-children, mentees). Some legacies may impact people we don't even know; as a result of the impact made on someone we do know that may be passed on to someone else, reacting like a domino effect.

All believers have some level of influence; someone whom God has called them to reach (our impact or imprint on the world) either through what we do or what we say. Children follow in their parents' footsteps. Not every parent is involved in their child's spiritual growth or is capable or willing to leave a positive legacy for their child. A pastor, teacher, or other adult may be influential in a child's life.

As believers, our legacy should be more than just material possessions and wealth. The most important legacy believers can leave are not those things that can be manufactured or bought, but those things that are taught daily through the lives of the believers.

Christ is the first-born of many brethren (**Romans 8:29**); a perfect model of what God intended for us to be. As followers, we are to imitate the example Christ has set for us. We are called to be imitators of Christ (**Ephesians 5:1**), to conform to Christ's image. To do this requires total dependence on God's Word and The Holy Spirit; surrendering "our will" to that of the Father. How we choose to live our lives will determine how much or how little of Christ's image we are able to imitate and ultimately project to the world. There are many self-help books on how to leave a legacy, but the Bible is a believer's most important resource. It is important that we pray and seek God to help us to leave the legacy that He desires us to leave.

A message of unconditional love also tells a child that he is "lovable"-not only to other people, but to God.

Paul identifies characteristics of the godly life necessary for godly relationships

We are only to walk in "close fellowship" with other believers. The Scriptures admonish us not to be "yoked" with non-believers (closely aligned with them or "one" with them).

- (1) What should I do if my children can't get along with others?
- (2) What are the secrets to good relationships?
- (3) How does Daniel 1:8 and Daniel 3:16-18 relate to being unequally yoked? What were they willing to do? How does this compare with your own attitude toward God's Word?

Our salvation is only the first step in establishing a relationship with the Father

Salvation is the step that establishes our relationship with God. It is however, only the first step in that relationship

How A child Learns to Pray

- I. A child mimics the way his parents pray in both terminology and attitude.

WEEK 3: CAPABLE OF OVERCOMING

Before we can "overcome" difficulties, we must first "know" and "believe" that we can (are capable of overcoming)

LESSON 4: An Awareness of Capability

An awareness of capability is an important foundation for a child to believe that he has something of eternal benefit to offer the world

Our capability in Christ includes spiritual gifts-those that the Holy Spirit imparts to us as permanent ministry gifts, and those that the Holy Spirit imparts to us temporarily as He wills.

- (1) What are your own capabilities? What are your child's God-given talents?
- (2) How does it feel to know that you are good at something and that what you do helps others? How much do you encourage your children's gifts and talents?

Every Child Is Gifted

Each person has been given talents and abilities from birth. The challenge for most parents is that a child's God-given gifts may not be the gifts that the parent wanted his child to have.

Parents must understand that their spiritual gifts may be different from that of their child. The goal is to help a child discover "his" gifts, both natural and spiritual.

- (3) What should we be training our children to do when they grow up?
- (4) How can you identify your child's natural abilities?
- (5) Read Proverbs 22:6. What does it mean in practical terms, to "train up a child in the way that he should go"?

(6) What ministries might God be planning for your children in the future? How can you train them now to exercise those gifts later?

Unique and Wonderful Gifts

No two people will function in their gifts in precisely the same way. We each have (S.H.A.P.E.)

-skills -heart (passion) -abilities -personalities (emotional temperament) -experiences (life experiences)

- (7) Do you give thanks to God for the gifts and talents that He has given you? Or do you sometimes wish that He'd given you different abilities?
- (8) What gifts and talents does the world esteem the highest? Lowest? What does Isaiah 54:16 suggest about that attitude?

Three Key Principles Regarding Your Child's Gifts

- I. we must discover and develop God's gifts
- (9) What does II Timothy 1:6 remind believers to do?
- (10) What does it mean, in practical terms, to "stir up the gift of God which is in you"?
- (11) What are you doing to "stir up" the gifts that God has given you? To stir up your children's (others') gifts?
 - II. God commands us to use our gifts as a means of serving Him and building up the Body of Christ

- (13) What things can you do this week to help your children (someone else) to "go and bear fruit" ?
 - III. God wants us to use our gifts in love, with humility, and in peace

- (15) Based on John 15:4-5 what does it mean to "abide" in Christ? Give practical examples of how this is done.
- (16) Do you tend to rely on your own abilities, or to ask God regularly for help and guidance? What are you teaching your children in this regard?
- (17) Read Proverbs 12:24. What things have you been diligent in developing in your own life? What areas do you tend to be more lazy in?
- (18) How can you train your children to be diligent-without being overbearing or nagging?

- (20) Why does Solomon combine "knowledge" and "wisdom" with works of the hands ("work or device")? What part does wisdom play in developing our gifts and talents?

LESSON 9: Overcoming Problems and Unpleasant Situations

Christians are not immune from problems and trials. We must recognize the true source of problems and face them squarely in the power of the Holy Spirit

Paul taught that a person can be content in any condition and that a believer in Christ Jesus can live victoriously in unpleasant situations.

- (1) What is the difference between problems and unpleasant situations?
- (2) How can we teach our children to overcome both?
- (3) What does Paul teach us in I Peter 2:15-16 about freedom in Christ?
- (4) What lesson did Paul say he learned in Philippians 4:11-13? How is this lesson learned?
- (5) How much contentment do your children see in your own attitudes? If they grow up imitating you, how likely are they to find contentment?
- (6) In Romans 5:3-4, what did Paul say he gloried in?
- (7) Give practical examples of how tribulation produces perseverance, and how perseverance produces character.
- (8) Why does character produce hope? Why are these qualities important in your children's lives?

Two Key Principles for Overcoming the Unpleasant

Paul placed emphasis on two key principles in overcoming the unpleasant

- I. Obedience
- (9) What did Paul write in Ephesians 6:5-8 that servants are to do?
- (10) What does it mean to obey "with eyeservice"? When have you seen this behavior in your children?
- (11) What principle was Jesus teaching in Matthew 21:28-31?

II. Diligence

God sees and rewards "what we do" as well as "our attitude" while doing it

- (12) Read Colossians 3:17. Give practical examples from your own life of ways that you can "do all in the name of the Lord Jesus". Give practical ways that you can teach this principle to your children (others).
- (13) What illustration did Jesus use in Matthew 25:14-30 to demonstrate how God views faithfulness?
- (14) What does Ephesians 6:4 urge fathers to do? Give practical examples of ways that a parent might provoke his children to wrath.
- (15) What is the "training and admonition of the Lord"? How does a parent bring up children that way?

Problems Versus Unpleasant Situations

Sin and evil are the source of all problems. The unjust persecution of God's people is also a problem in God's eyes.

The Solution to Sin-related Problems

-confession of that sin to God

- -repentance
- (16) According to Psalm 32:5, what is the solution to problems that arise from our own sin?
- (17) When have you tried to hide your own sin? When have your children discovered them just the same?
- (18) When you lose your temper or hurt your child, how often do you apologize to him? What is the relation between confessing sin to God and asking forgiveness from others?

The Solution to Persecution-Related Problems

-prayer

- -trusting God
- -doing good to the persecutor

Endurance of any persecution related to faith results in a great reward from God.

(19) According to these scripture passages: Psalm 142:6; Romans 12:19; Deuteronomy 32:43; Nahum 1:2; Matthew 5:10, 44-45, how are believers to respond when faced with persecutors?

- (20) When have you been persecuted for your faith in God? When have your children been persecuted for their faith?
- (21) How do you respond to people who treat you badly? What situations are your children presently facing that can serve as lessons in loving their enemies?

The Solution for Satan-Created Problems

Satan works through persecutors and through evil people to create negative situations in our lives-intended to destroy us and demolish our witness for Christ.

WEEK 4: WALKING INTO BLESSINGS

God is a Spirit; we must worship Him in spirit and in truth if we are to know and receive the blessings God has promised us

LESSON 5: An Ability to Walk In the Spirit

No-one can receive Christ on behalf of someone else; that is a decision that must be made individually

Parents face three challenges in teaching a child to walk in the Spirit: -Leading Your Child to Christ

Your responsibility as a Christian parent is to champion the truth about Jesus Christ as Savior (not to give your child options about what may or may not be true).

- (1) What does it mean to "walk in the Spirit"?
- (2) What does the scripture passage in Acts 26:9-19 describe?
- (3) When and how did you accept Jesus as your Savior? Write down and share your story with your children (or someone else) this week.
- (4) According to I John 1:9, what must we do to receive salvation?
- (5) What is the difference between being "forgiven" for sins and being "cleansed from all unrighteousness"?
- (6) What does Jesus teach us in John 14:6 concerning the path to God?
- (7) Put into your own words these claims of Jesus:
 - -The way -The truth -The life

-Saying No to Temptation

The way your child learns to say no to temptation is to see you say no to temptation.

(8) Read James 4:7-8. How does a person do each of the following?
-submit to God
-resist the devil
-purify your hearts
-draw near to God

-Walking in the Spirit

Walking in the Spirit is a daily process. It is trusting and relying upon the Holy Spirit every day for guidance and courage. Each of us must choose daily to be "filled" with God's Spirit so that everything we say and do is a genuine reflection of Christ Jesus.

There are four vital aspects of walking in the Spirit

- I. The Holy Spirit wants us to be separated from everything that is contrary to God's Will
- (9) According to Ephesians 5:8-11, 17, what does "walking in the Spirit" involve?
- (10) According to Ephesians 4:25, 31-32 and Ephesians 5:3-4, 18, what are some behaviors that are contrary to the Will of God? Make a list of things Paul tells us not to do. Make a list of things Paul tells us to do.

II. We have a responsibility to yield ourselves entirely to Christ Each of us is under authority to someone

- (11) What does Jesus teach in Matthew 6:24 concerning two masters?
- (12) What do Luke 7:1-10 and Ephesians 6:1 teach us about yielding?
- (13) According to I Peter 5:5, what is the best way for your children to learn how to be submissive?
- (14) How well do you submit to others?
 - III. To be cleansed from all sin and yielded to the Holy Spirit results in a life of great joy!

- (15) What does Paul call believers to do in Ephesians 5:18-20?
- (16) According to Nehemiah 8:10, what is the "joy of the Lord"?
- (17) In what ways can the "joy of the Lord" bring a person strength? Give Practical examples.
 - IV. As the Holy Spirit convicts us of sin, we must ask for immediate Forgiveness

(18) According to James 1:12, what does it mean to "endure temptation"?

LESSON 10: In Position to Receive God's Rewards

Good stewardship and generosity are the keys that unlock God's storehouse of blessing

From the Bible standpoint, a successful life means

-training your child to be a good steward of all his resources first and foremost, his life

-be a generous giver to God's work and to those in need

Good Stewardship

Our attitude toward money must be free of envy, greed, and idolatry

- (1) What does success mean in terms of leaving a legacy?
- (2) Where do we draw the line between working hard and giving generously?
- (3) How can we train our children to receive God's blessings and rewards?
- (4) What does Matthew 6:20-21, 33 urge us to do?
- (5) Read Colossians 3:5. Why does Paul say that covetousness (or materialism) is idolatry? Why is materialism listed alongside fornication and other "really bad sins"?
- (6) What does it mean to "put to death your members"? What sort of "death" is involved in overcoming materialism?

Our position toward money should be neutral-it is what we do with money that counts

- (7) Read Proverbs 1:18-19. Explain how being greedy for gain is like plotting against your own life.
- (8) What is your own attitude toward material possessions? What attitude are you seeing reflected in your children's lives?

We are commanded to work honestly

- (9) What is the connection in II Thessalonians 3:10-12 between not working and being a busybody?
- (10) What is your child's attitude toward work? How much does this reflect your own attitude?

We are commanded to trust God to provide what we need and to guide our work

- (11) What are your emotional responses to the following words?
 - -work
 - -prosperity
 - -greed
- (12) Read Proverbs 13:11. Where is the balance between trusting God to provide for our needs, and being responsible to earn a living?

Generosity in Giving

Those who give generously will receive generously.

-tithing is an act of faith that we are trusting God to grow the seed that we plant and cause it to multiply on our behalf

Jesus taught specific things about our giving

- (13) What does Malachi 3:8-12 teach about tithing regularly?
- (14) Read II Corinthians 9:6-7. Explain how being generous is similar to sowing and reaping crops.
- (15) What specific things does Jesus teach about giving in the following

passages? -Matthew 25:37-40 -Mark 12:41-44 -Matthew 6:1-4 -Acts 20:35

The tithe is the standard for giving to God's work.

- (16) What truth does I Chronicles 29:14 teach us about all that we have?
- (17) According to II Corinthians 9:7-8, what is the most important aspect of tithing? How can a person gain this?
- (18) According to these verses, for what purpose does God bless us when we tithe cheerfully?

Your Children Follow in Your Footsteps

- (19) What does Proverbs 12:24 warn against?
- (20) Who do you know who has risen to success through hard work? Who has been forced into menial tasks because of laziness?
- (21) How can you teach diligence to your children (others)?
